German Rouladen is Tops With C. W. Bennett Family

Today's guest cook is Mrs. Charles Bennett, 724 Calle de Arboles, who moved to the Hollywood Riviera last May from Santa Barbara.

The Bennetts, Mr. and Mrs. and William Ricker, two and a half years, came to Santa Barbara after a several years residence abroad. They had resided in Bad Nauheim, Germany for four and a half years. Mr. Bennett is an engineer and while he was employed in Germany, he and his wife traveled extensively.

But when their son was born in Frankfurt, Germany, the couple decided it was time to return to the States. Mrs. Bennett says "we have found the German people to be friendly, hard working, pleasant and eager to rebuild their war torn cities. It was fantastic to watch Frankfurt, a neighboring city of our quiet spa town, emerge from a mass of rubble to a city of towering modern structures which would make many of the buildings in our American cities look outmoded."

Mr. Bennett is now an engineer with North American. Mrs. Bennett is a member of the Torrance Junior Woman's Club. The recipe which she is contributing today, she learned in Germany. It is a favorite company meal as most of it can be prepared several hours in advance of the arrivals and there is no last minute cooking.

GERMAN ROULADEN
1 to 2 pounds round or flank steak sliced 1/4 inch thick. Cut these slices into strips 5 to 8 inches long by 4 inches wide. Sprinkle a little minced onion and horseradish over meat. Place a small piece of bacon on this and roll up—fastening with two or three toothpicks. Two pounds of meat should make approximately 10 meat rolls.

Roll steak in seasoned flour and brown these in a heavy pan (a pressure cooker is excellent) and place on a rack in a roasting pan. Add salt and pepper and almost a full quart of water. Cover tightly and roast in a slow oven 300 degrees for at least three and a half hours.

Mrs. Bennett says she likes to serve baked potatoes with this as she can stick the potatoes in the oven with the meat. However she states, mashed potatoes go well particularly since the meat makes an excellent gravy. Almost any vegetable is good with this meat, but again, our guest says she chooses one which can be prepared in the oven (Harvard Beets, creamed onions au gratin etc.). A salad and a light dessert team well for a hearty meal.
