United Nations Week will be highlighted locally by an International Family Festival to be held Saturday from 1 p.m. to 10 p.m. at Aviation High School, Manhattan Beach Blvd. and Aviation Blvd. Incorporated as an appreciation of national customs with the spirit of fun, the festival will include exhibits, displays, gourmet buffet dinner, and a program of songs and dances of other lands.

Of special interest to children will be the afternoon program. Dances to be performed will represent India, Scotland, Japan, Mexico and Greece. Among those dancing in the opening number will be Torrance residents Faye and Phyllis Murasaki, Mrs. Stanley Murasaki and Brian Thompson. Mrs. Murasaki is also serving as emcee.

OTHER TORRANCE residents who will be represented are Mr. and Mrs. Elias de la Vega, who will contribute to the Argentine display. John Strawn, former resident of South Africa, who is exhibiting ritual witch doctor masks, leopard and deer skins, drums, hand woven cloth, and native wood carvings; and Mrs. J. W. Clemenger, who will be chairman of the West Africa booth.

Concluding the program will be an evening program which will include Negro spirituals by Stella Herman of El Camino; an Indian dance by Joseph Gutta of Los Angeles; the United Nations hymn sung by its composer, Frances Hall; and dances from Holland, Argentina, Japan and Iceland.

Fluoridation of Domestic Water Is On The Increase

ONE REPORT on the use of fluorine originated from the pioneer city of Grand Rapids, Michigan, which was the first city to add it to the public water supply. The reduction of tooth decay in this community ranged from 76 per cent in the six-year olds to 29 per cent in the 16-year old group, but was less in older children because fluoridated water was not received during the early formative years.



AS WITH magnesium, iron, lead and other minerals present in water, larger amounts than trace quantities of fluorine may eventually produce untestable physiological effects. For this reason, the U.S. Public Health Service sets up recommended standards for drinking water and it may not contain more than certain amounts of any of these desirable chemicals. In the case of fluorine, it may not exceed more than 1.5 p.p.m. (parts per million) and less than this amount in warm climates where the consumption of drinking water is usually great.
