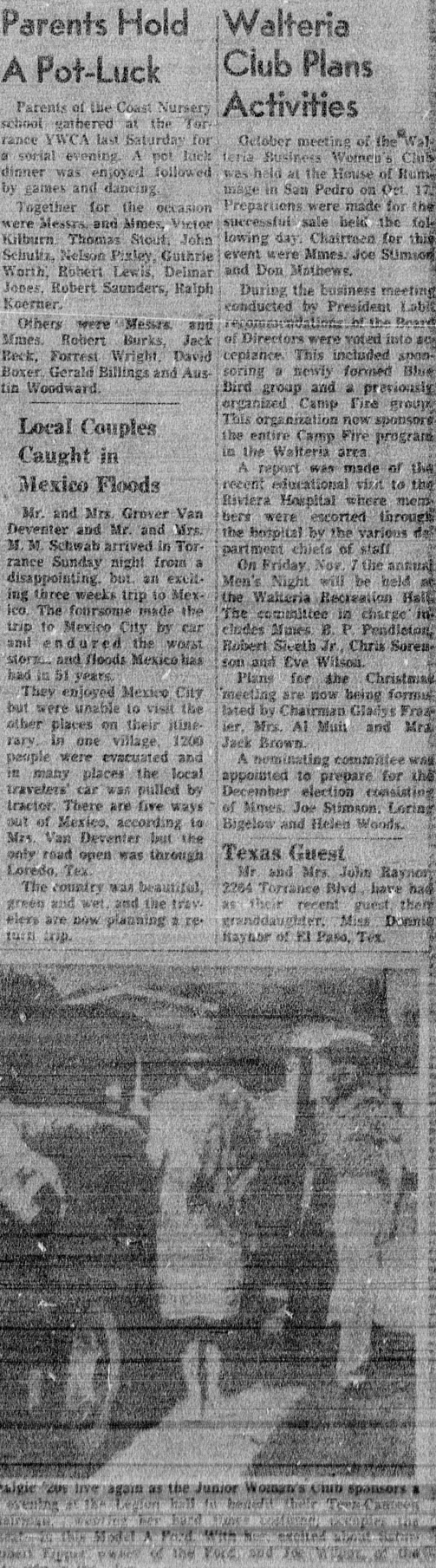
They also have two grand-children, Mary Ann Larson and Johnny Harrington, one week old.
