

GARDENERS CHECKLIST

- 1. Late-flowering sweet peas can be sown now for bloom next spring and summer. Work the soil deep, with plenty of manure under the seeds.
2. The deadline on Dutch Iris is approaching. They prefer early rather than late planting. You can't wait much longer and expect the best results.
3. Broccoli, cabbage, Brussels sprouts, chard, cauliflower, peas and lettuce are on the list of vegetables to be planted this month.
4. A few packets of wildflower seed, broadcast in a vacant lot or in an out-of-the-way garden spot will do wonders toward brightening life next spring.
5. Primula malacoides, the Fairy Primrose, is a good bet for late winter and early spring edgings where winter is not severe. Give it loose, rich soil, a fair amount of shade and plenty of water for best results.

Former City Attorney Says 'Yes' on DEF Passage of Propositions D, E and F, the Los Angeles County General Hospital Bond issues, was urged yesterday by James M. Hall, former Torrance city attorney. The three bond issues totaling \$14,913,000 would finance construction of an outpatient clinic, a building housing the School of Nursing and resident nurses and living quarters for interns and resident physicians at General Hospital. "These are necessary additions to General Hospital," Hall said, "to relieve intolerable overcrowding at the hospital that is providing neither the proper patient care nor efficient use of tax dollars supporting this institution." Hall, a resident of Torrance, said the board of supervisors has reported it will order this necessary construction regardless of the outcome of the election. "The issue is whether to pay for the building program with a tax levy of 14 1/2 to 15 cents on next year's tax bill or to spread the cost over the term of 20-year bond issues, sharing the expense with future taxpayers, at the rate of less than one cent a year," Hall said.
