The week will be climaxed by the crowning of the queen and the Homecoming Dance the night of our game against Inglewood High School Nov. 14.

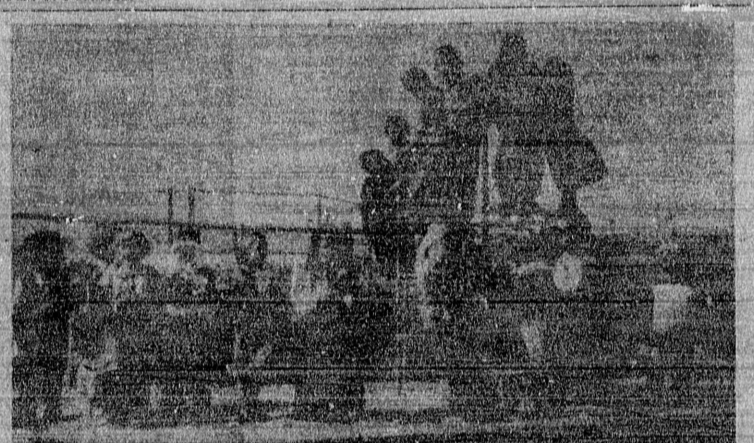
