

Saxons Lose To Morningside Team In Second Half Grid Hartbreaker

Howard Johnson's Monarchs came from behind a 13-0 Saxon lead Friday at Sentinel Field to defeat the Shoup charges 40-19. The Monarchs scored six times, all in the second half, to knock the Saxons from the top league spot into a tie with Morningside for first place honors.

After a scoreless first quarter the Saxons broke the ice to climax a 57-yard drive by sending Ernie Thomson over from the one. Hershel Lawson added the PAT to send the North squad into a 7-0 lead. In the first series of plays in the second half Larry Balliett fumbled on the Monarch three and Eddie Jauregui recovered it for Morningside. Hal slipped a pass on a drive to put the Monarchs in a 15-point lead.

MORNINGSIDE'S first score came on a 35-yard pass play from QB Balliett to Dale O'Neal. Balliett added the extra point. The Monarchs recovered a North fumble and capitalized on it with a 21-yard run by Ken del Conte, with Balliett again adding the PAT to send the Monarchs into the lead, 14-13.

On the first play of the fourth quarter the Saxons were forced to punt. Thomson's punt went to the 20-yard line where George Hanstard took it and streaked down field for 69 yards and a TD. Balliett's educated toe sent the ball flying through the uprights again. Bob Pier came into the Monarch spotlight as he intercepted two North passes and returned them for 50 and 25 yards respectively and added two more Monarch touchdowns to 33-13, and seemed as if it broke the Saxons.

THE MONARCH scoring rampage ended when Larry Balliett, on a keeper, broke loose for 33 yards and six more points, and then added the extra point to send the Morningside tally to 40.

Late in the fourth quarter Bill Hall fumbled on the Monarch 40. The Monarchs recovered, only to fumble on the first play. The Saxons turned on the steam, and with the aid of a 15-yard holding penalty against Morningside, Hall went over from the one with about four seconds left in the game. Lawson's try for the extra point was blocked.

Ocean Fish Group Seeks Conservation
