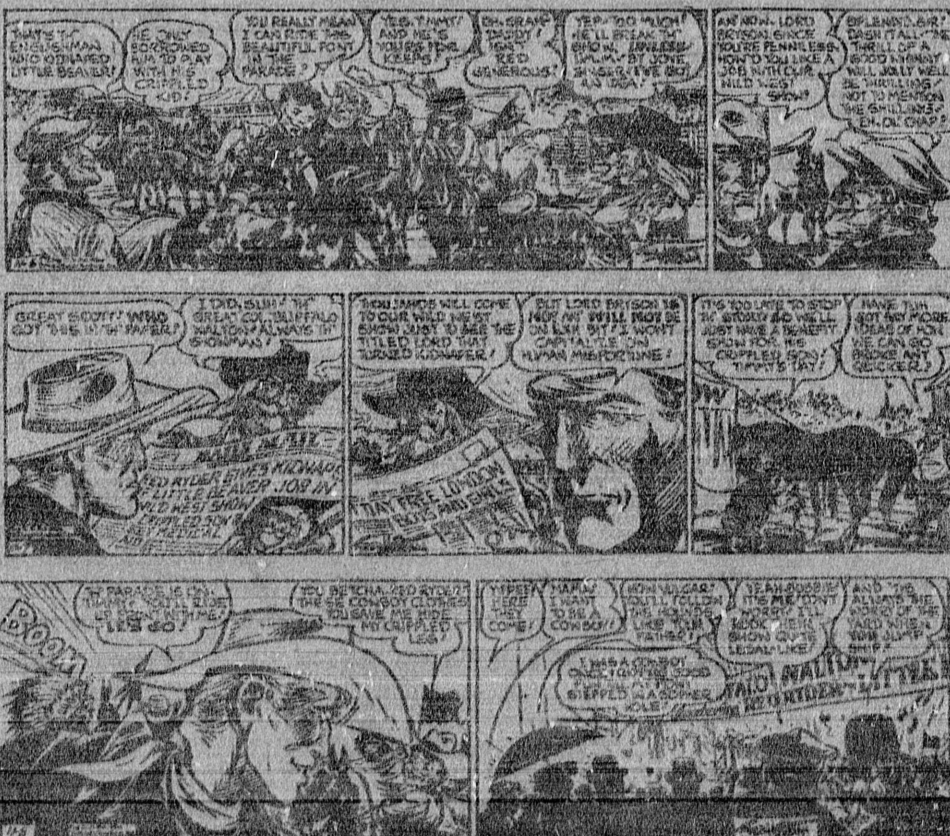

BLOODMOBILE NEEDS VOLUNTEER NURSES

Volunteer nurses are urgently needed for each bloodmobile that visits the Torrance, Gardena, San Pedro and Wilmington branches of the American Red Cross.

Those interested in joining this group will be given at the Regional Red Cross headquarters, 200 W. 7th St., San Pedro, on Tuesday, Nov. 18.

Mrs. Mildred Nelson, nurse recruitment chairman, pointed out that local nurses currently volunteering their services to this program are providing an essential link in the Red Cross process of securing an adequate supply of blood for ap-

proximately 100 hospitals in Los Angeles and Orange counties. She explained that demands upon the Red Cross blood service have become more pressing since the institution of the open heart surgery program which is enabling children doomed to early death or in- validism to look forward to normal lives.

The nurse most likely to volunteer is the one who has retired from the profession, but who would welcome the opportunity to give one day a month to this community service, Mrs. Nelson stated. The victory was the biggest in the Congressman's career and may be the greatest majority polled by any congressional victor West of the Mississippi, his office stated.
