Big Day Against Green Bay Team

Bill Wade had his biggest day as a Ram player against the Green Bay Packers last Sunday, yardage-wise, when he passed for a total of 372 yards. His previous high yardage total for one game was 291 yards made against the San Francisco 49'ers in 1956 on 16 completions out of 27 attempts.

Against Green Bay, Bill attempted no less than 52 passes, the most he has ever thrown in a Ram game. After eight games this season, Wade has thrown 13 touchdown passes to equal his best previous record for the Rams set in 1956.

Jon Arnett continues to lead the Rams in rushing with 504 yards in 91 carries for a 5.6 average per lay. In kickoff returns with 11 for 213 yards, in punt returns with 13 for 192 yards and is second in pass receiving with 25 catches for 289 yards or a grand total of 1204 yards.

The Ram's defensive unit increased their interception record to 23 for the season, just one behind the Baltimore Colts, who have intercepted 24 and next Sunday's crucial at Baltimore will be a real battle between the defensive backs.

North High Defeats Hawthorne Gridders

Patty Reynolds became the first homecoming queen in the history of North High to reign over a Saxon victory Saturday night as Captain Ernie Thomsen and the Saxon gridders presented her majesty with an 18-4 win over the visiting Hawthorne Cougars. The win extended the North record to 3-1 for the present campaign and kept the Saxons in the three way tie for top league honors.

The scoring began just two minutes and fifty-four seconds into the first quarter when Chuck Webb raced the whole Cougar squad downfield for 73 yards and the first score of the game. It came on the second North High play in the game. The remainder of the first half was played on the Cougar end of the field, with Hawthorne rubbing up against a solid Saxon line.

NORTH SCORED again in the third period when Ernie Thomsen took the ball from Bill Hall after the Saxons recovered a Hawthorne fumble. Thomsen broke loose for 21 yards and payed to read 'the

Shoup charges into a twelve point lead. Late in the third quarter Hawthorne quarterback Steve Anderson dropped back and fired a long pass to Russ Jacobson, who rambled into the end zone. The play was good for 35 yards and the only Cougar score of the evening.

The final touchdown came on a 36 yard run through the center of the Cougar line by fullback Thomsen.

More than 2000 fans braved the high winds to see the final home game of the Saxon season.

THE NORMANS of Beverly Hills are next on the Saxon agenda with the North squad meeting Beverly on the Normans gridiron in an afternoon tilt tomorrow. Coach Shoup and the team from North Torrance will be six point favorites as both teams close Pioneer league action for this season.
