### Oleander, Other Ornamental Plants Dangerous When Ingested

Although perhaps less numerous than the castor bean plant, oleander is one of the most common poisonous shrubs in Los Angeles County. At least two small children are usually the victims, and each year a number of them are treated for oleander poisoning. Occasionally, a fatality occurs.

The oleander is an attractive, evergreen shrub that is native to the Mediterranean region and grows abundantly in California. It has narrow, leathery leaves that exude a milky substance when punctured. The rose-like blossoms may be white, pink or red, and form a cluster at the end of the stem.

ALL PARTS of the oleander shrub are poisonous, and it does not take very much of it to cause severe poisoning or death. In southern Europe the plant is used as a rat poisoner since its action on rodents is much the same as that of red squill, which is widely used in this country as a rodenticide. Examples of the oleander's potency as a poison are recorded in medical literature. A few years ago, two soldiers died following the eating of steaks that had been speared on peeled oleander sticks and roasted over a fire.

EVEN THE smoke from a burning oleander bush may be hazardous. In Florida, about 10 years ago, a fireman was reportedly overcome by the fumes of a burning oleander hedge.

The active and poisonous principle of the oleander (oleandrin) is similar to digitalis, a drug that is widely used to treat certain heart disorders. Indeed, extract from the oleander was even used as a digitalis substitute in Europe more than half a century ago.

THE USUAL symptoms of oleander poisoning are similar to those induced by an overdose of digitalis and include abdominal pain, vomiting, convulsive movements, dilatation of the pupils, rapid respiration, and a slow, irregular pulse which may become rapid and weak in those instances where the poisoning is serious. In fatal cases, death is due to paralysis of the heart.

It is important to obtain medical aid as quickly as possible when this type of poisoning is suspected. There is no antidote and emergency treatment consists of measures to delay the absorption of the poison.

LEGISLATION to remove these shrubs would not be practicable. As it happens, the oleander is only one of the many poisonous plants that are found nearly everywhere. The deadly lily, the sweet-smelling narcissus, wild garlic, the berries and seeds of the common privet, the Jerusalem cherry, holly, holly, mistletoe, holly fern, Adonis, and larkspur are but a few of the growing things that are poisonous if ingested. Wholesale extermination is manifestly impossible.

Adults should therefore be warned that certain evergreen shrubs as well as plants in the house, house children should not be allowed to play with poisonous plants or to play unsupervised where they are growing. Children should also be taught as early as possible that ornamental plants are to be
