increase the pressure would not solve the overall problem because of the low volume of

water, it was pointed out.
FIRE CHIEF J. J. Benner warned the city that it should "carefully scrutinize each area prior to final approval of ad-

ditional structures" in the district served by the Torrance Water Co. He cited low water pressure problems the Fire Department had encountered on recent fires in that area.
Several years ago, a man lost his life in the area because firemen could not get

enough water to a burning home.
A PUBLIC hearing on Narbonne Ranch Water Co. No. 2 which serves an adjacent area has been set for Dec. 16 in Torrance by the Public Utilities Commission. Low water pres-

sure and inadequate service was cited in the order calling the hearing.
Residents in the area served by the latter firm recently petitioned the city council for assistance in getting adequate water supply to their homes.

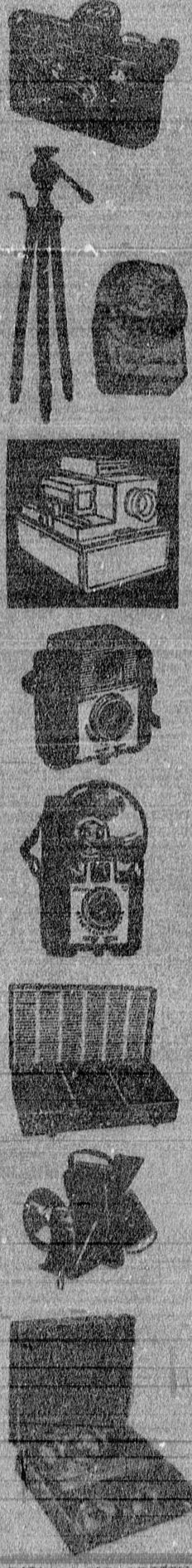
