tons of sewage water each day. "I think this is the beginning of the most constructive program as yet in solving our water shortage," Supervisor Hahn declared.

He pointed out that for many years the Hyperion sewage treatment plant of the City of Los Angeles has dumped 200,000 million gallons of water into the ocean daily.

This water is treated and all sludge removed so that it is 99 per cent pure before it is put into the ocean. At the same time, the underground basins have been endangered by the intrusion of salt sea water.

"This is a tremendous waste of one of our most important natural resources and we must do everything possible to reclaim this water and put it to good use," he continued.

The report pointed out that it is feasible to reclaim 200 million gallons of water out of a total of 465 million gallons being dumped into the ocean through the Hyperion plant of the City of Los Angeles and the Whale Point plant of the County Sanitation Districts.

About 85 per cent of this amount could be purified and put back into the ground to replenish the underground basins, the report said.

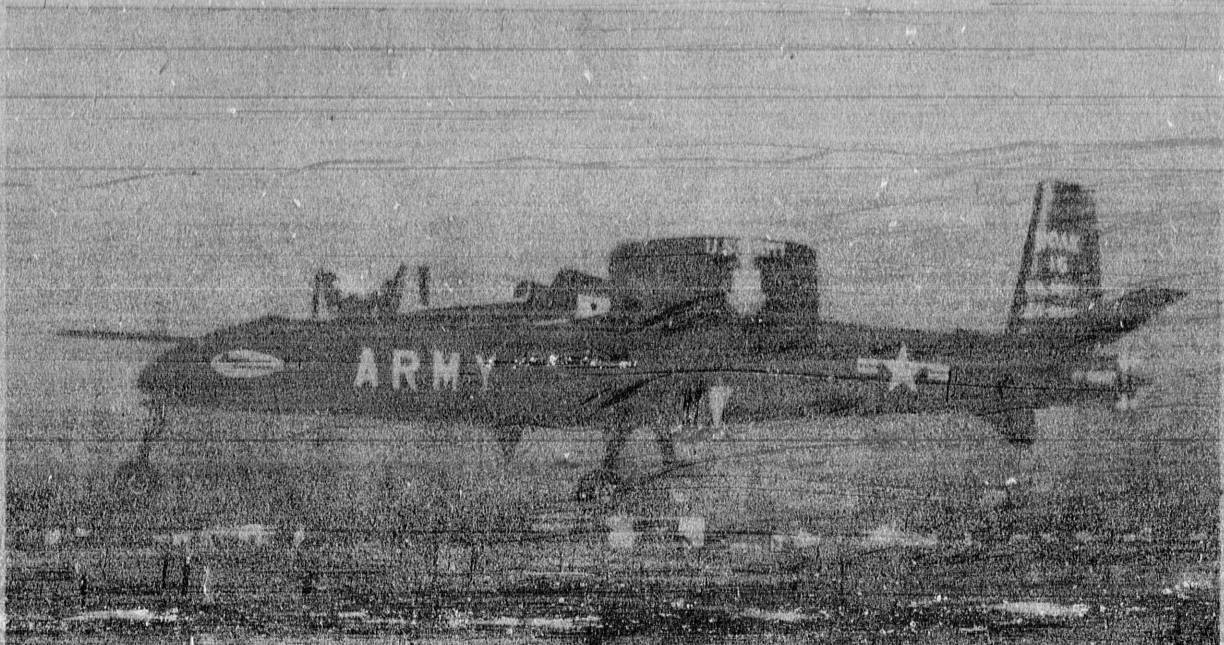
Offbeat Chess Set On Display At El Camino

An unconventional chess set which won an award for an El Camino college art student at the Los Angeles county fair this fall, is currently on exhibit for the public in the patio of the art department at El Camino college.

The designer of the offbeat chess set is 32-year-old night student Allan Ferguson, who is employed on the midnight to 3 a.m. shift at Northrop Aviation.

Ferguson's unique set features a brown and yellow 30-inch chessboard carved from wrap lumber and three-inch chessmen of the same colors.

His best-backed king is dwarfed by a pouter pigeon queen, which dominates the board. The bishop is designed as a flycatcher killer with a netter than most facial expression. Bearing knights with boron's face, the knights have men's faces. Expressions on the faces of the expendable pawns, whom Ferguson compares to infantrmen in the modern army, show dislike and disgust.
