 At the present time there are 250 employees working in the hospital, which itself is a city within a city. In addition to the nursing service rendered by the hospital, the hospital maintains its own laundry, electrical plant, food service department, and keeps a complete record on every patient admitted to the hospital.

TORRANCE Memorial Hospital enjoys the highest award presented with the full approval by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals which stands for quality medical care. As a community hospital, all patients regardless of race, creed or color, are permitted admission, and unlike many California hospitals, no deposit is required on admission.

Leonard Knosinger, hospital administrator, stated that the first patient was admitted to the hospital on May 17, 1925 and was discharged from the hospital three and one-half months later. He further stated that with the improved medical and surgical techniques it is very rare for a patient to remain in the hospital over a prolonged period, and the average length of stay in 1958 is approximately four days.

In comparing the growth of Torrance with the number of hospital patients admitted, it was found that the first 50,000 patients were admitted over a 26-year period and in the seven years since 1971 an additional 50,000 patients have been treated at the hospital.
