A report on aid rendered to the disaster victims of the March fire, as well as assistance given to some of our local residents was given by Mrs. Patricia Grain. The aid is an out-right gift from the public to disaster sufferers through the Red Cross.

Mrs. Gordon Jones reported on blood recruitment in the district and this led to an explanation of changes in the blood bank. Unless deposits equal or exceed withdrawals, no bank can remain solvent, and so many groups and individuals have become so lax in their replacements that they are overdrawn.

"Is a financial institution the account could be closed, but you can not refuse aid to a life dependent on the blood in our tanks. So we must dip into the reserve, and unless that is replaced, we like any other business, could face bankruptcy. Your visit to the blood bank, therefore, because of such great importance," Mrs. Jones said.

The need for more volunteers was stressed, and the fact that two hours means so little to most of us, but so much to the Red Cross.
