ECC Swimming Registration **Next Saturday**

Registration for the final two Registration for the final two summer periods of swimming instruction at El Camino Col-lege will be conducted Satur-day morning, Dr. Stuart E, Maree, president of the college announced today. In the first six weeks of the program, nearly 1000 swim-mers used the pools each day for swimming instruction. Ad-ditional residents of the com-

ditional residents of the com-munity took advantage of the colege swim facilities daily for recreational swimming.

Minimum age for instruction is 7; swimmers must be at least 50 inches in height. Instruc-tional periods from August 3 to 14 and August 17 to 28 will be established as follows: 8 a.m. - 9 a.m. -10, 11 and 12-year-olds

Tickets insuring in-struction may be obtained at the Saturday registration in the Campus Center, starting at 8 a.m. Any tickets not sold on registration day may be purchased next week in the college business office. Chil-dren may purchase tickets themselves, but children must accompany adults who wish to purchase tickets for the child.


