

## Rec Director Sees Search For New Space

Sale of the old city hall may force curtailment or elimination of the Recreation Dept. arts and crafts program, according to Recreation Director Harry Van Bellehem.

He said the space in the northeast corner of the building now being used by the Arts & Crafts Center will be occupied by the end of this month by the Home Savings & Loan Assn., which purchased the entire building last week.

Moving of the center to any one of the department's eight other buildings would result only in displacement of some other activity, Van Bellehem declared.

THERE IS some chance that the program might be carried on to some extent at the Benstead Plunge when that facility is closed to swimmers next month, he said. However, this might hinder readying of the pool for the next season.

The arts and crafts center has attracted more than 1,000 children and adults a month.

Van Bellehem said the city also is faced with finding storage space for equipment from the Civic Auditorium when that building is turned over to the Security-First National Bank at the end of this month.

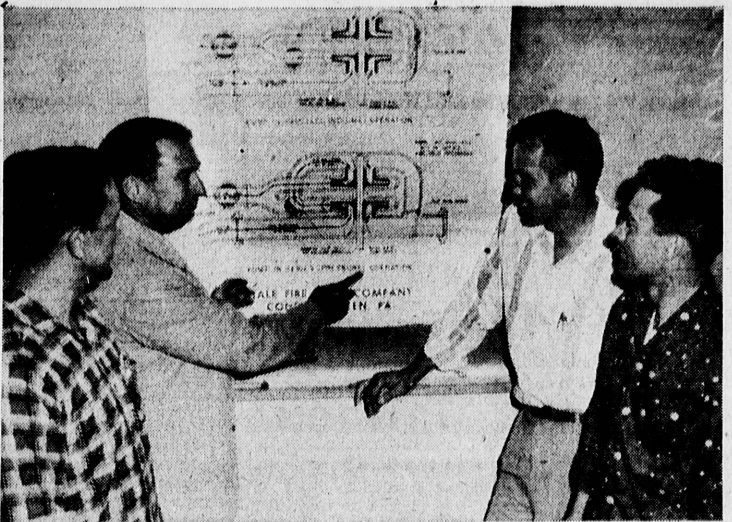

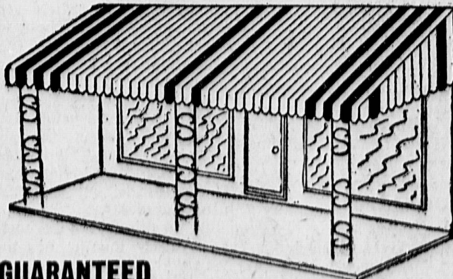

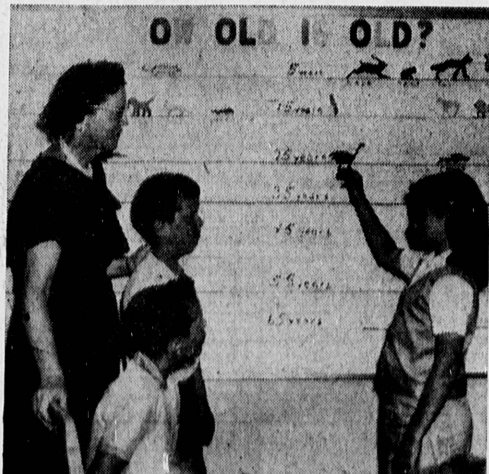
