A graphic portrayal of the many health safeguards through which the County Health Department contributes to the security of the individ-Heatin Bepartment contributes to the security of the individual, was given by a film brought by H. L. Messier, assistant director of the sanitation division, to the regular quarterl ymeeting of the Lomita Civic League at Lomita Elementary School.

Messier explained the enormous growth of the health department due to increased population, and to contracts with most of the cities in the county for health supervision.

D. W. Colfelt, chief sanitarian at the county health center in Torrance, came to the meeting to acquaint himself with Lomita people and their problems. He stated that inspectors are available for consultation between 8 a.m. and 9, be-
