### Swedish Linipa Bread 1/4 c. molasses 1/3 c. sugar

11/2 c. warm water 2 pkgs. dry yeast

21/2 c. rye flour

1 tbsp. salt 2 tbsp. shortening Grated orange rind 2 to 3 c. flour (1 or 2 oranges) In mixing bowl, stir warm water and dry yeast. Stir in molasses, sugar, salt, orange rind. Mix in rye flour, sifted,

and shortening. Work with spoon until smooth. Then with hands, mix in sifted flour. Turn onto lightly floured board. Knead about 10 min utes and let rise in a greased bowl until doubled (about 11/2 hours.) Punch down and let rise again about 45 minutes. While rising, keep covered with damp cloth. Knead down and divide dough into two parts. Place on opposite corners of greased cookie sheet. Let rise about an hour. Bake 375

degrees for 35 minutes. Orange Frosted Cinnamon Rolls

1/2 c. warm water 2 tsp. salt
2 pkgs. dry yeast 2 eggs

11/2 c. warm milk

1/2 c. shortening 7 cups sifted flour

½ c. sugar Mix water, yeast, milk, sugar, salt, eggs, shortening and one-half of flour. Mix until smooth. Add enough remaining flour to handle easily; turn onto lightly floured board, knead until smooth (about 5 minutes). Round up in greased bowl, greased side up. Cover with damp cloth. Let rise twice, first time until double about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours. Knead again and let rise about 30 minutes.

Divide dough for desired rolls and coffee cakes. Roll dough into 15x9 oblong shape. Spread with 2 tbsp. melted butter and sprinkle with  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. sugar and 2 tsp. cinnamon.

Roll up tightly, beginning at wide side. Seal roll by pinching edges of roll together. Stretch roll slightly, then cut into 1-inch slices. Place on greased pan and before rising frost with Quick Creamy Orange Frosting.

3 tsp. butter 1 tbsp. orange rind

Orange Frosting
2 tbsp. orange juice 11/2 c. powdered sugar

Use one-half of frosting before baking. Let rise until double in bulk 35-40 minutes. Bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes. Cover with remaining frosting while warm.


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
