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Financial Status of Disability Insurance System Not Hopeful

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complicating factor. Our unemployment insur-ance system seems to be in good shape for the foresee-able future. While we increas-ed the maximum weekly ben-efit amount, effective Jan. 1, we also raised the tax base by which employers must measure the taxes they pay. A new schedule of slightly higher employer tax rates goes into effect in 1961. BUT THE financial status of our state disability insur-ance system seems to be headed downhill, according to testimony given a subcom-mittee of the Assembly inter-im committee on finance and insurance at its recent hear-gram reported that the state agency which runs the pro-gram reported that the state disability fund will operate in the red this year. Estimated benefit payments are placed at \$92.5 million, and net reve-nues at only \$77.3, thus indi-cating a deficit of \$15.2 mil-lion for the year. And it looks as if the down-hill trend will continue until the fund is in a "precarious" shape, according to these wit-nesses. Taking into account a raise, effective January 1st, in the maximum weekly bene-fit from the present \$50 to

a half times the increase in wages. THAT DOES NOT tell the full story of more liberal ben-efits. In addition to the week-ly benefit raises, we granted a cash hospital benefit in 1950, and have since twice upped it, until it is now \$12 per day of hospital confine-ment, up to 20 days in one year. year.

From the facts thus given us, it is apparent that the heavy drain on the state disa-bility fund has been caused by frequent liberalizations in benefits, not by any mishand-ling of the fund or malinger-ing on the part of those drawing benefits. It was anti-cipated that some action would be needed to level out the situation. Working out an equitable and adequate solution looks like it will require all of the time for study available be-tween now and our 1961 see-sion. There's no room for further maneuvering below the present tax rate.
