## **4th Quarter** Touchdown **Beats THS**

Torrance's hopes of a share in the Pioneer League varsity football championship were washed down the drain Friday night by Aviation's rambling Falcons, who stopped the Tartars cold, 6-0 at Torrance.

An "impotent offense" which sorely misses are halfback Joe Montgomery failed to hit the scoreboard for the first time this season as Aviation won its third straight league game. Towance is 22 Torrance is 2-2.

Aviation played conservative Aviation played conservative football for more than three quarters, until Halfback Den-nis Hearn ripped off a 30 yard touchdown run for the lone touchdown of the game with three minutes to play.

Three consecutive penalties set up the score. Prior to the TD gallop, Aviation had not penetrated past the Tartars' 20 yard line, and the Falcons punted every fourth down sit-uation.


