Civic Leaders Inspect Facilities Of Southern California Gas Co.

Steps the Southern California Gas Co. is taking to insure an ever ready supply of natural gas to the bulging Los Angeles complex were detailed last weekend to a representative group of civic leaders and businessmen of the company's southwest division.

As guests of the utility, the group toured the Playa del Rey underground storage project and then flew in two chartered planes to Needles, Calif., to inspect the Texas-to-California pipeline crossing of the Colorado River and visit facilities at Needles and Topock, Ariz.

MAKING THE trip from Torrance were Councilmen George A. Bradford and Jay Beasley, Municipal Court Judge Donald Armstrong, Assistant City Attorney Bob Dowser, Past Chamber President Fred Mill, Current Chamber President J. H. TO MEET THIS peak need four underground storage projects have been developed for the Los Angeles area. The storage reservoir at Playa del Rey is owned and operated by the Southern California Gas Co. alone. Located in a depleted oil field, this project covers 200 acres of land and has a capacity of one and one-half billion cubic feet. The reservoir is located at a depth of 6,000 feet below the surface.

Giant compressors totaling 6220 horsepower are used to increase the gas pressure to 1500 pounds so that it can be injected into the reservoir. Over 12 1/2 million has been invested to date in this project.

APPROXIMATELY 75 per cent of the gas supplied to local consumers comes from out-of-state sources. Pipeline deliveries now are nearly six times larger than they were when the first 30-inch pipeline was completed in 1947. During 1957 the Needles-to-Newhall 30-inch line was placed in operation.

Gas for this line is supplied by the El Paso Natural Gas Company from its Texas fields. The group visited the facilities of this unit at Topock and saw how the gas is metered at the time of delivery to the Southern California Gas system. Recently completed compressor facilities 10 miles south of Needles enable the local system to nearly double the daily load capacity along the 241-mile line to Newhall.

Built at a cost of \$4,000,000, this station houses five 2000 h.p. turbo-charged compressors and auxiliary facilities. It provides a capacity of nearly 300 million cubic feet daily. Plans for this station include an allowance for expansion. Additional compressors will soon be installed and eventually the plant may contain 20 such units with a total of 40,000 h.p.

AN OPERATING base has been constructed within the town of Needles. This provides office space, a radio communication center and storeroom facilities for the area headquarters and pipeline maintenance crews needed to keep the many miles of desert pipeline in top operating condition.

Enroute home from Needles the group landed at Apple Valley for a buffet luncheon and short program at the Apple Valley Inn. R. P. Blackburn, senior vice president of the Southern California Gas Co., spoke to the group, telling of the utility's long range plans.

The entire trip was under the direction of Carl W. Shinn, southwest division manager. Other gas company officials were in attendance, among them being Harry Pottle, division sales manager, and James Becker, manager of the Torrance office.

Jerry D. Hahn, seaman 114N, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Bier, son of Lamits, serving aboard the heavy cruiser USS Holms, took part in a large fleet training exercise off the coast of Southern California, Nov. 9-9, involving units of the U.S. Pacific Fleet.

Mormon Leader To Speak to Torrance Stake

Members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) will hear addresses by a prominent church leader at the Torrance Stake Conference on Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 14 and 15, in the San Pedro Ward Chapel at 1878 West 9th Street.

The visitor is Bishop Joseph L. Wirthlin, Presiding Bishop of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Conducting Saturday meetings and Sunday general sessions at 9:30 a. m. and 2 p. m. will be Roland Earl Gagon of 3332 Winlock Road in Torrance, Stake President. The public is invited to attend.

Bishop Wirthlin operates a food distribution business, and became the eighth presiding bishop of the Church in 1952, after years of devoted church service as a missionary, ward bishop and stake president. In his present assignment, Bishop Wirthlin directs the priest-to program among young men of the Church.

Each of the nearly 300 stakes or regional divisions of the Church holds a conference four times yearly. Speakers will report on the expanding missions of the Church here and abroad and give counsel concerning the youth program, priesthood quorums, Relief Society, and welfare programs.

World-wide membership is more than 1.5 million, and the Church maintains a full-time missionary force of nearly 6,000 in some 50 missions.
