West Basin Compiles History **Of Events for Nov 17 Vote**

Background of the events which led to the proposal to form a water replenishment district in the southern part of the county has been compiled by the West Basin Water Assn., one of the areas to be included in the proposed district.

Torrance voters will be asked to vote on the matter a week from Tuesday, Nov. 17. The memorandum, compiled by the West Basin, is hereby published for the information of Herald readers:

A sub-committee of the Group released a report in October, 1945, recommending the formation of a water as-sociation to be comprised of municipalities, industries and water companies relying upon the ground water supply, and as a result, the West Basin Water Association was organ-ized and its first meeting was held in February, 1946. **Water Association as organ-ized and its first meeting was** held in February, 1946.

THE ASSOCIATION obtain-

THE ASSOCIATION obtain-ed an independent survey and report, prepared by Harold Conkling, Consulting Engineer, and released in July, 1946. This report recommended for-mation of a municipal water district and its annexation to the Metropolitan Water Dis-trict in order to obtain an ad-ditional supply of water for the West Basin. continued its studies of the problem of ground water de-pletion and intrusion of sea pletion and infrusion of sea water, and in 1951 was instru-mental in securing an appro-priation of \$750,000 from the State of California to finance an investigation of means for stopping the sea water en-croachment.

By 1953 a line of injection wells had been constructed in the vicinity of the City of Man-hattan Beach and fresh water hattan Beach and fresh water obtained from the Metropoli-tan Water District was being injected as a means of wedg-ing out the salt water that had been seeping into the Basin. This experiment proved highly successful.

trict. Consequently, in 1955, the Assn., in cooperation with other water agencies in south-ern California, was instrumen-tal in securing adoption of the Water Replenishment District Act. This Act was drawn es-pecially to meet the problem confronting the southern Cali-fornia ground water basins open to sea water intrusion and in need of extensive re-plenishment. plenishment.

In 1957 and 1958 the Assn. In 1957 and 1958 the Assn. joined with the Central Basin Water, Assn. in an intensive study of the problem of re-plenishing the ground water basins and stopping further in-trusion of the sea water.

THE STATE Department of THE STATE Department of Water Resources and the Los Angeles County Flood Control District have also made exten-sive investigations of the prob-lem and a plan was finally de-vised under which the Metro-politan Water District agreed to furnish the water necessary for replenishment and the

for replenishment and the fresh water barriers. The fresh water barriers. The Flood Control District agreed to receive the water delivered to receive the water delivered by Metropolitan for spreading or for supplying the fresh water barriers to recharge the ground water basins and stop the seepage of sea water. It remained necessary to de-vise some means of financing the purchase of Colorado River water in sufficient quantities
