
Tartars Tie 'Gundo; South, North in Upset Losses EL CAMINO BLASTS SAN DIEGO. 28-14

Spartans Outclassed by Underdog Aviation, 26-6

In a rags to riches football fairytale, Aviation pulled the rug out from under South High Friday night for an upset 26-6 victory to send the Pioneer League standings into a mad scramble with one week remaining in the season. The Falcons completely dominated both offensive and defensive factions of the

Eastwood, Dean of Student Activities Dean of Student Activities at Los Angeles State College and chairman of the Com-mittee, pointed out that, on the basis of investigations which have been possible to date, 13 of the 15 deaths were the result of injuries to the head and spine area. 
