Shores Tourney Jinx On All-Metro to Torrance Teams

The 1959-60 basketball season lands on us with both feet this week, with tournaments for both varsity and class B teams occupying the sports spotlight as the last of the football season is tucked away for mothballs.

The annual Pacific Shores Tournament opened yesterday, and will run through Saturday night when the championships will be held at Redondo High. All three of Torrance's teams are entered in the South Bay Union High School District

The junior wingback has as much ability as any player in the league, is a triple threat back, a top defensive player, and was the league's leading individual scorer with 50 points. The coaches, Jack Cowan and Jim Mathews, are both from Torrance, as is more than half of the squad. In winning their conference championship the Yellowjackets were unscored upon in seven games. For the season, they had 230 points and were only scored upon twice!
