Sift mixing flour; measure, add soda and spices, sift again. Cream butter; add sugar gradually; cream together until light and fluffy. Add well-beaten egg yolks; beat well. Add molasses, fruit juice, brandy and strawberries; blend

Turn into cake pans which have been greased, lined with heavy paper and again greased. Bake in a slow oven (250 degrees) about three hours for two cakes weighing about three pounds each. Remove cakes from pans and let cool. When thoroughly cold, remove paper, wrap well and store in airtight container.

 Mix butter with salt, confectioners' sugar, and extract.

 Beat until light and fluffy.
 At low speed beat in flour
 and fold in oats until just mixed. Form dough into medium sized canes and place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake 20 minutes at 325 degrees. Makes about two dozen canes. When canes are cooled, spread with sugar glaze and sprinkle with colored sugar immediately, or decorate with slivered candied cherries or red icing stripes after white icing has set.

SUGAR GLAZE

Blend one cup sifted confectioners' sugar with five or Cunningham, 825 Sartori Ave. six teaspoons water.
