

Board Studies Special Class Arrangements

A plan to set aside permanent facilities at six elementary schools, for use of special education classes, was taken under study by the Torrance Board of Education Tuesday.

Under long-range plans, classrooms at Casimir, Magruder, Jefferson, and three still unbuilt schools would be used for instruction of moderately mentally retarded youngsters. Nationally, about three per cent of children fall in this category. At present 238 childcategory. At present 238 child-ren are enrolled in special classes, but this figure will in-crease ,the board was told.

Under proposed plans, special classrooms at one school would serve the special education programs of several other elementary schools in the area. In the past, the program has been located at less-crowded schools in the district. The proposal would not go into effect until sufficient class-rooms are built for the district.

As school population in-creases, and as method of identifying such children improve, officials anticipate a need for twice as many classrooms for this purpose as at present.
