Local Advetists to Begin New **Cancer Society Study Tomorrow**

were mailed from Seventh-day

to 51 Southland Adventist
churches in the first phase of
a special Adventist contribution to the nation-wide epidemiology study now under way
by the American Cancer Society

The questionnaires are going to volunteer leaders in Adventist churches in Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and Ventura countieh of 100 or more members who will implement of 30 study among all members of 30

Beginning date of the study is Feb. 1.
Clarence C. Kott, Glendale, health services director of the health services director of the Adventists' Southern California Conference, said the reason for the special study among California Adventists is to determine whether health practices and living habits of Seventh-day Adventists, which differ in some instances from members of most other religious groups. of most other religious groups, affects cancer incidence.

KOTT SAID some 10,000 questionnaires are being sent Adventists in the three South-Adventists in the three South-land counties comprising t he church's Southern California Conference. Throughout Cali-fornia some 70,000 Adventists will participate in the study. "Seventh-day Adventists as a rule of faith neither drink al-

"Seventh-day Adventists as a rule of faith neither drink alcoholic beverages or use tobacco in any form including cigarettes," Kott said. "These facts will be noted in this study along with all other living habits of those participating to deits of those participating to de-termine if differences noted are significant in terms of cancer incidence."

THE OFFICIAL pointed out that California Adventists have not and are not participating in the broad, nation-wide survey already under way because ACS officials asked that the special study on California members of the church be conducted separately.

A recent report from the Stoan-Kettering Institute for

Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research indicated that a study of Seventh-day Adventists revealed male members of the church are 90 times less likely to get lung cancer than

other men.
