INVESTIGATING OFFICERS said yesterday that the lad ap-parently fell into the water as parently fell into the water as he tried to climb, hand over hand, across the channel lead-ing into the main sump. The area is surrounded by an 8-foot fence topped by three strands of barbed wire.

Two other 10-year-old boys, Two other 10-year-old boys, Ronnie Brenden of 4802 Louise, and Dewane Day, 5232 Doris Way, were with the Middle-kauff lad at the time of the tragedy.
