



Prepared by Wade E. Peeb-les, director of public works, the cost of the plans would range from \$4700 to \$6300 de-pending on site approval and alternate proposals for the building.

One site recommended is the present triangle used as a bus terminal at Torrance Blvd. and Sartori. The second site is at El Prado and Torrance Blvd., and the third is at the Cravens end of El Prado Park.

PROPOSED is a basic depot which would include a passen-ger waiting room and two rest rooms in a stucco building. An alternate would provide office space for the city's bus super-intendent

space for the city's bus super-intendent.

Cost of the bus depot only at the Torrance Blvd. triangle would be \$4700, Peebles esti-mated. Addition of an office would bring the cost to \$6300, he said. A similar cost was es-timated for such a depot at El Prado Park.

COST OF placing the depot at Torrance Blvd. and El Prado would be only \$3300 or \$4900 if the office was added. The difference is in cost of instal-(Continued on Page 3)
