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
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

An Editorial

The latest chapter in the case of sadist-rapist Caryl Chessman proves once again that decent, God-fearing people are too prone to believe that public officials in high places will do the thing that is legally and morally right when they are called upon to make serious decisions.

Spokesmen for Governor Brown's office reported last
