Dear Wondering: I'm sure you meant well but next time check with a welfare agency and learn who needs help. Or give directly to the agency and let THEM distribute to the needy.

A Marine Corps sergeant with eight years of service gets \$325.90 a month if he has two children. There is no extra allotment for additional children. The basic allowance for living quarters is \$96.90 a month if there are more than two dependents. The sergeant and his family are entitled to SOME medical care, and there's a retirement plan after 20 years. A Marine Sergeant with six kids may well be hard-pressed financially, but he can work out a loan at low interest with the help of a government agen-
