J. C. Penney Co. will occupy a building within the mall facing Hawthorne Blvd. having 200 feet of frontage. Neighboring J. C. Penney will be Silverwoods, F. W. Woodworth Co., Learner Shops, Leeds Shoes, Wetherby-Kayser Shoes, and the Ontra Cafeteria.

Operating from an 80,000 square foot satellite building directly east of the Broadway store is the recently opened Magic Chef Market and Thrifty Drug's Del Amo store.

INCORPORATED into the Del Amo Estate Co.'s plans for comprehensive development of their Hawthorne Blvd. properties is the 64,000 square foot Del Amo Medical Center building being constructed in two phases, phase one already complete and the second phase well under construction at this time.

Handling all lease negotiations for the Del Amo properties is Coldwell, Banker & Co., statewide real estate firm which operates 12 offices throughout California and Arizona.

Presently, the International House of Pancakes operates four dining facilities located in Toluca Lake, Panorama City, Woodland Hills, and the Broadway-Crenshaw Shopping Center. New units are planned, in-
