## No Substitute for Cash

Disclosures during the past two weeks before the city council that the city has failed to collect the full amount of its costs on a water line extension point up emphatically the dangers in any deviation from a strictly "cash in hand" policy for such projects.

The city now has been placed in the position of a fin-ancier for private developments. While officials have indi-cated that the city will eventually recover its money, the procedure whereby such an event could occur has no place in the city's operation.

Without regard to who might hold the responsibility for this particular incident, either among the city employes or officials, the HERALD believes that a serious review of city policy on this and other matters is demanded.

Heads of the various city department, administrative officers of the city, and other, in fairness to them, should be given hard and fast rules covering such cases.

A number of individuals have told the HERALD that

the procedure which brought on the present problem is a common practice in many places.

While it may be convenient, 99 per cent safe, and time-saving, it is no substitue for strict cash in advance policy when public money is involved.

## An 'Oversight'

News that Torrance was incorporated in 1921, has grown to the fifth largest city in Los Angeles County with a federally counted population exceeding 100,000 persons, and is the home of many of the Southland's leading industrial and commercial giants has apparently become garbled in the long, long way through channels to the policy makers on the State Division of Highways level.

Construction of the Harbor Freeway, accomplished now to a point south of 190th St. and at a cost of millions of dollars, is reasonably complete except for one detailnot minor.

There is still no sign near any of the off-ramps in this area indicating that the cruising motorist is in the Torrance region. Persons traveling into this area for the first timeand their numbers are growing daily-will need a prior briefing, or a lot of luck to realize that the monstrous ribbon of concrete has brought them to the outskirts of Tor-

rance.
The HERALD noted this "oversight" when the latest portion of the freeway was opened last month, and the city council has since taken official notice of the lack of a Torrance sign on the freeway.

We don't know what such signs cost-probably more than they should—but it still seems a reasonable request that this area be pointed out to the traveling public as it whizzes along the super highways.

We would like to recommend that the chief sign authority for the department send a memo down to the shops calling for the erection of a "TORRANCE" sign somewhere near the present freeway terminus.

# Huffing and Puffing offers to sell you a diamond ring, you have a right to think that he owns and has the right to sell the ring.

You see much of human nature shining through our

laws.

Your salesman may get carried away and claim too much
for his product. Sometimes
you can force him to make
good on his claims, or give
your money back.
But not if he was merely
"puffing". Puffing is not true
warranty.

★ ★ the Suppose a salesman claims that if you buy his car — whammy: The girls will come running for dates.

That is puffing. An opinion at best, Anyone should know better than to believe it. Anyhow, no court is likely to force the salesman to make good his claim. good his claim.

But suppose the salesman claims his car is new or that nobody else in town could got it. And suppose you found it was used and you could buy others like it anywhere.

That's not puffing but a "warranty." And you can get your money back. But you couldn't make him deliver the dates with the girls.

Warranties are either express (written or spoken) or implied in the way you act. Suppose as a seller you claim that an article — say a television set on a car\_is in television set or a car—is in good working order when it isn't.

So you buy it, but the jewelry store comes and takes it away from you. The man didn't own the ring after all. Then, you can sue the man.

## New Magnavox Research Plant Is Dedicated Here

the new Magnovox Research Laboratories at 2829 Maricopa St., have already become a busy place fos the hundreds of lab technicians who use the facility. The unit has been planned so that it can be easily expanded and company officials report that the facility will eventually be more than four times its present

The Industrial division of the Magnavox Co. has the responsibility for managing the new research unit. The company will engage in the development of communication equipment including radar

Manager of the unit is Dr. Ragnar Thorensen. He directs a staff of 200 persons, including more than 100 graduate engineers, physicists, and mathematicians.

The concrete and steel laboratory was designed on a 50foot module for both economy and ease of addition and omy and ease of addition and expansion. It has a control center designed to maintain rigid dust and temperature control. Separate air handling units provide for prescription temperature and humidity controls in each unit of the lab.
