Harbor College Readies for Fall Semester

Over 400 courses will be of-fered by Harbor College dur-ing the fall semester, which ex-tends from Sept. 12 to Jan. 27, according to an announcement today by William H. McMas-ters, dean of admissions and guidance.

Major fields of study in which day and evening class-es will be offered include sci-ence, mathematics, engineer-ing, business, electronics, print-ing, architecture, art, drafting, philosophy, speech, nursing, history, psychology, English, Spanish, literature, education, engine technology, and many others, McMasters said.

others, McMasters said. ALL CLASSES are tuition free, carry regular college credit, and meet from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Mondays through Fridays. Any high school grad-uate or person 18 years of age or over may attend by follow-ing required entrance and reg-istration procedures. All new students, day and extended day, should file appli-cations for admission and reg-istration permit requests at the college admissions office, and arrange for previous high school and college transcripts to be mailed to Harbor College. In addition, new full time day students, and evening stu-dents who expect to receive an appointment to take the 3½ hour college entrance tests on one of the following datas:

hour college entrance tests on one of the following dates: Aug. 19, at 8:30 a.m.; Aug. 29, 6 p.m.; or Sept. 3, 9 a.m.

6 p.m.; or Sept. 3, 9 a.m. PERMITS TO register on a specific date in August or September will then be mailed to qualified applicants. Currently enrolled and re-turning students should file requests for registration per-mits at the admissions office and enroll on the date indica-ted in the permits, which will be mailed to qualified appli-cants. Returning st u de nt s should also file applications for admission and transcripts of college work completed since leaving Harbor. "As a result of June regis-tration, many students have al-ready enrolled for the fall se-meter. It is advisable for everyone who has not register-ed, to do so at once by follow-ing enrollment procedures. De-lay will result in unnecessary difficulties concerning hours an d programs," McMasters pointed out.

Alondra Park Plans Trip To Catalina

Alondra County Park is of-fering an all-day trip to Cata-lina Island for all teenagers 13 to 18. The trip is scheduled for Aug. 31 and is for all teen-agers who wish to sign up. The fee for transportation to and from the Island from the park area is only \$6. Registration is being taken now until Aug. 28. All money and consent slips must be turned in to the park director by that date. Registration slips may be picked up at Alondra Park, either at the new activity build in g, 3850 Manhattan Beach Blvd., or the community build.
