

Dates Set Registration dates for all students in the local area who will attend Los Angeles City Schools have been set, according to the Board of Education. Students who will attend elementary school for the first time in Los Angeles may reg-ister from Sept. 1 until Sept. 8. Pre-school registration will be held on Sept. 2 through 8. Junior and senior high school pupils who must regis-ter may do so during a three

ter may do so during a three day period beginning Sept. 6. This registration period is for students new to the school, students who need special counseling seervices, or stu-dents who need a change of programe due to summer programs due to summer school attendance.

Proof of age is required for children entering kindergarten or first grade. Students enter-ing junior high or senior high should bring any records of their last school attendance.
