South High School:

All students who live in the following elementary attendance areas: Hillside, Meadow Park, Walteria. All students who live west of Hawthorne Blvd.,

and south of Torrance Blvd. All students who live in the Wood and Adams elementary attendance areas. This does not include studenis who attended Torrance High School during

the state Torrance High School:

1959-60.

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
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
All students who live in the following elementary attendance areas: Fern-Greenwood, Madrona, and Torrance Elementary.
