A bountiful turnout of 71 A bountiful turnout of 71 candidates including 11 returning lettermen and 17 players weighing in around the 200 pound mark have El Camino College's Norm Verry bouncing with optimism for the coming 1960 football wars.

A heavy list of new recruits and sophomore vets, including Ron Veres, "Athlete of the Year" last season, are reporting to daily drills at the junior college campus.

VERES, a Torrance High product, is expected to see plenty of duty at the all-important signal-calling slot. All told, 16 of the 71 prospects were groomed in either Torrance High, North, or South high schools.
