Riviera Lutheran Church Opening Building Campaign

The congregation now has a Day School with grades from Kindergarten through eighth.

Crossing Guards to Be Posted At 23 Dangerous Intersections

Crossing guards will be posted at 23 locations during this school year, according to word received by the Torrance Schools from the Torrance Police.

The Police indicated that after study, they had selected locations considered most dangerous for the posting of the crossing guards. Guards are assigned from 30 to 45 minutes before and after school and 15 minutes before and after lunch periods.

The Police indicated that they would study several other locations to determine hazard to youngsters.

Local Man Told Feds May Look At Land Again

A local man has received a letter from the General Services Administration, informing him that the Torrance Schools' application for 26 acres of surplus Navy land is still being considered and that it was seeking to resolve the problem to "satisfaction of all concerned."

Charles Deck, president of the Torrance Property Owners Assn., had written, supporting the schools' application for the land, which would be used to expand Torrance High athletic facilities.

A letter from Curtis A. Roos, director of disposal for the GSA in Washington, said, in part:

"If it can be shown that there is no other suitable property available within the school district limits that can be acquired at a price substantially lower than the value of the 26 acres, our decision to deny the assignment will be reconsidered."

Representatives of the San Francisco Regional Office are presently working closely with Mr. Hull in an effort to resolve the problem to the satisfaction of all concerned."

The GSA turned down the district application for the land, saying it was better suited for industrial use. However, Superintendent J. H. Hull appealed the action, declaring that the Torrance situation is unusual and not like other cities.

Two courses in real estate will be offered in Torrance as part of an expanded University of California Extension Real Estate program this fall.


