

Panorama of Progress Marks Tenth Anniversary for SARC

The Southwest Assn. for Retarded Children was represented at a four-day "Panorama of Progress" that marked the 10th anniversary of the national movement to aid the mentally retarded. President Harold McBride announced today.

The local group was one of 800 state and community units taking part in the decennial convention of the National Association for Retarded Children in Minneapolis Oct. 5 through 8. Named as proxy for Southwest Assn. for Retarded Children were Clair Gurgener, president of the California Council for Retarded Children, and Joseph Costa, 1st vice

president, as alternate. A decade ago, 42 parents met at Minneapolis determined to improve the lot of five million retarded in the United States, McBride explained. They started a nation-wide demonstration that the retarded can be helped to develop, learn, and work. The local program started in the year of 1959.

The Southwest Area of Los Angeles County is still far short of a truly adequate program of education and training for the retarded, McBride said, but there has been important progress.

The Southwest Assn. sponsors a teen-age party time, on

the fourth Friday of each month, Scout Troop 777, Cub Pack 777C, and has started a recreational and hobby crafts program in co-operation with the Los Angeles Dept. of Parks and Recreation, in Lennex activity center one day each week for three hours.

There are some school class-

es for retarded children in the southwest area of Los Angeles County. In 1950, when the parents movement was organized virtually none of these facilities existed.

Board Studies Sale of Two School Sites

Possible sale of two pieces of property owned by the Torrance Unified School District is being considered by the Board of Education. Funds from the sale might be used to add to funds in a very tight budget.

The two pieces of property in question are the "old" Walteria School site, just off Pacific Coast Hwy., and about two acres of the Columbia School site, 186th near Hawthorne. The Columbia site requires less space than the old El Nido site upon the same area.

The board has been holding the property in hopes that prices would increase to bring a good return.

Noted Artist To Visit in Area Oct. 21

Dr. Marques E. Reitzel, California Artist-in-Residence, in pursuit of an elusive goal "to paint the face of a state," is coming to Torrance on Friday, Oct. 21.
