

Stunned officials of the Torrance Unified School District vesterday began consideration of a new revenue proposal to submit to the voters after a requested 50-cent werride tax was beaten at the polls in a special election.

Override tax was beaten at the poils in a special election. One of the largest turnouts in local school history de-feated the proposal 6793 to 5406 as more than 12,000 of an estimated 40,000-plus eligible voters cast ballots. Tuesday's loss was the first in the 13-year history of the school district for a proposal submitted to the people by the school board.
