

SOUTHLAND SCOUTS TO CAMPAIGN FOR VOTERS

Joining the five million Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers in the United States who will participate in the third national Get-Out-The-Vote campaign, 50,000 Scouts and leaders of the Los Angeles Area Council are preparing for the starring event of the Golden Jubilee Year.

As in 1952 and 1956, this great nonpartisan effort to get out a record vote in the national election is under the joint sponsorship of the Boy Scouts of America and the Freedoms Foundation, Inc., of Valley

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On Oct. 29, 10 days before the election, a mammoth distribtuion of Liberty Bell placards urging citizens to vote wil be distributed to 40,000,000 homes throughout the nation. The Scouts, trained in an orderly and systematic distribution method, will hang the placards on the nation's front doors. Residents will be asked to display the reminder in their front windows until Election Day, signifying their intention to vote.

The Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge and the Boy Scouts of America efforts contributed much in the increased voting total in 1952 and 1956.

The Get-Out-The-Vote campaign is strictly nonpartisan in its concept and execution.

As in all national Good Turns and other service

projects undertaken by the Boy Scouts of America, the development of character and good citizenship is the prime motive behind the actual job.

The League of Women Voters of California supports Proposition 1, authorizing the issuance of \$1.75 billion in general obligation bonds to build a state water system. There is an immediate need for the control, development and redistribution of California's water resources.

The League of Women Voters of California supports Proposition 5 on the 1960 ballot which will increase state legislators' salaries from \$500 to \$750 per month. The League has long believed that legislative compensation should be sufficient to attract qualified persons to seek and hold public office. As California's population has rapidly increased, the work-load of the California legislator has become heavier each year. It is now estimated that the average legislator spends from one-half to three-fourths of his time on legislative matters. Legislators have not had a salary increase since 1954 although their duties and responsibilities have increased
