Social Security Credit for War Service Listed

Persons with active military Persons with active military duty during the period from Sept. 16, 1940 through Dec. 31, 1956, are entitled to Social Security wage credits of \$160 for each month of active duty, Veterans Service Officer Mrs. Sara R. Bridges, director, Torrance Veterans Service Center, said today in a reminder to veterans.

Ninety days of active service are required unless the vet-eran was discharged or released for disability or injury in-curred or aggravated in line of duty, and the discharge must have been other than dishonor-

THE WAGE credits may be granted to those who died in service as well as to those who died after discharge, it was

also pointed out.

However, if a periodic benefit is payable by the military organization or another federal agency, except the Veterans Administration, based in whole or in part on active military service during the same period, the Social Security wage cred-its will not be granted for that same period.

THOSE ON military retired pay also may receive the SS credits for months of active duty during the years 1951 through 1956, even though their retired pay is partially based on service between July 25, 1947 through Dec. 31, 1956, provided they served actively after Dec. 31, 1956.

Citizens of the United States who served in the armed forces of U.S. allies during World War II also may be entitled to the SS wage credits, under certain restrictions. THOSE ON military retired

On Jan. 1, 1957, members of the armed forces on active duty were brought under Social Security on a contributory basis, with payments to the fund withheld from their basic pay. Contributory SS wage credits for active military service may be added to any gratuitous a n d/o r civilian wage credits in determining Social Security benefits.
