Sohner to Tour 46th District **Area Saturday**

Instead of 76 trombones it will be the assorted honks of that many horns, give or take a few, rousing the citizens of the 46th Assembly District on Saturday when the Demorcatic Sports Car Caravan makes its rounds to give folks an opportunity to see and hear Charles P. Sohner, candidate for the State Assembly.

The caravan will leave Inglewood Headquarters, 409 East Manchester Blvd., at 10 a.m., heading for the Westchester Headquarters, 9115 Sepulveda, where they are due by 10:30.
Leaving Westchester at 11 a.m., the group moves on to the foot of Pier Avenue in Hermosa Beach, arriving at 11:40. At 1 p.m., following a break for lunch, it is scheduled to pull out of Hermosa, and pull into Redondo Beach Park at 1:30. The cavalcade will leave Redondo Beach Park at 2 p.m., arriving at Harbor Heights Shopping Center, Western Avenue at 290th Street, San Pedro, at 2:30. This is the last scheduled stop, and after a rally there, the survivors and their vehicles will head for home.

As part of the Caravan, a hand-picked group of "Kennedy Girls" will add beauty and charm to the occa-sion, and the musical depart-ment will be handled by the Pacific Dixieland Jazz Band.

The total body of parading cars is expected to grow constantly, as additional ones will be picked up at each reception. In charge of the Caravan is Ronald Davidson of Inglewood, who will be assisted in all or who will be assisted in all op-erational details by Jack Mitch-ell of Rolling Hills Estates, George Stevens of Hermosa Beach and Ernest Pollok of Hollywood Riviera.

Warwhoop in All-American Class Again

All-American honors for excellence in college news presentation have just been awarded to the Warwhoop of El Camino College for the 14th consecutive semester, Merl F, Sloan, director of student personnel announced.

One of three weekly junior college newspapers across the nation to win the top award of the Associated Collegiate Press, the Warwhoop grossed a total of 3652 points to lead its field in evaluations of spring semester publications.

"YOU CONTINUE to set the pace for college journalism with a combination of top-notch creativity and plenty of hard work," judges advised the college journalism staff.

Other comments lauding the college weekly were "Your features reflect the creative aggressiveness of your staff," "You are most professional at news-writing," and "Your photo work is superb!"

Evaluating sports coverage, judges noted, "You certainly touch all bases — and then some. You make sports news come alive."
