County Studies Bids for Area

Seven bids ranging from \$244,600 to \$266,256 were under study by County Engineer John A, Lambie today for construction of the County's proposed new Animal Shelter No. 3 at Brondway and Victoria 3 at Broadway and Victoria Sts. in the Carson area .

According to Supervisor Burton W. Chace, the plans call for construction of an of-

call for construction of an of-fice building, two kennel build-ings, a barn and utility build-ing, and landscaping.

The apparent low bidder, ac-cording to Chace, is James E.
Rowe, of 3200 Sanborn Ave., Lynwood.

THE OFFICE building con-THE OFFICE building con-tains the director's office, a general office, public space, storage, janitor's closet, men's and women's toilets, squad room with showers and lockres, mechanical equipment room and public telephones. The building will be equipped with a complete air condition-ing, heating and ventilating

system.

Both Kennel Buildings are identical and provide for forty-eight kennels and adjacent exterior runs in each and a mechanical equipment room. The buildings are ventilated and heated! The barn contains two stalls for large animals and a hay-and-grain storage room.

THE UTILITY building contains a veterinarians' room, walk-in refrigerator, work room, cat quarantine, food storage, toilet facilities, and a vehicle wash rack and truck storage area. This building is provided with heating, ventialting, and a unit air cooling system.

All one-story structures' contain a total gross area of 11,944 square feet. All floors are constructed of reinforced concrete slabs on grade except for the large animal stalls of the barn, which have exposed earth floors. The exterior and in-THE UTILITY building con-

which have exposed earth floors. The exterior and in-terior walls and partitions of the office building are of wood studs plastered both sides.

EXTERIOR SITE work inextended site work in-cludes grading, paving, park-ing and driveways, walks and curbs, water trough in pasture area, planters, exterior light-ing, fences, concrete block walls, gates, landscaping an d sprinkler system, flagpole, drainage facilities and connec-tion to public utilities.

According to Chace, a contract will be awarded by the Board of Supervisors as soon as the low bid is confirmed and the successful contractor will be allowed 210 days to complete the job.
