Brunch was served followed by bridge. Mrs. Albert Morton held the high score and Mrs. Jack Hertel was second.

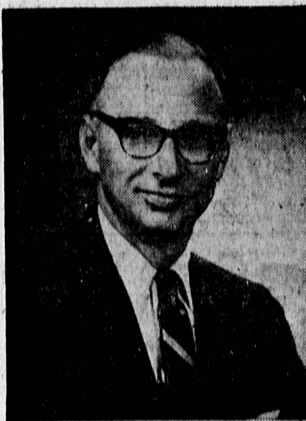
