McKESSON recalled that during his 14 years on the bench as a Juvenile judge, scarcely a day passed without somebody telling him what caused juvenile delinquency. He said these persons would name various causes ranging from broken homes, liquor, and automobiles to lack of playgrounds and even modern education.

DISTRICT Attorney McKesson urged youth be provided "the strengthening, soul-satisfying assurance that can only be found in religious training. "When the list reached 137, I quit counting and began to have misgivings about the validity of what I was being told."
