

When a horse is claimed he is at least in training and may earn something for his new owners. With the yearling the price paid is only the beginning. He must be sent to an equine kindergarten to be trained and, unless the owner has his own farm, boarded, because stall space at the race track is limited to horses ready to run. This year's yearling will not be ready to race until January 1. The board bill and training expense will run about \$400 a month, plus shipping costs, veterinary expense.
