

Large Turnout Expected for GOP Luncheon

Republicans are expected to turn out in large numbers to hear the California State Republican Chairman, V. John Krehbiel, when he addresses the Centineia Valley Advisory Board of Republican Associates and their guests, Feb. 6, at the Buggy Whip Restaurant, 7420 La Tijera Blvd.

Krehbiel, a Pasadena insurance executive, has been active in Republican politics since 1934 when he started as a precinct worker. In 1942, he became a member of the County Central Committee and was elected its chairman in 1953, serving through 1958. He stepped up to the state level as

vice chairman in that year and succeeded to the State Chairmanship in 1960. A member of the U.S. Trade Mission to Germany in 1959, he has been a delegate to the last three Republican conventions and is an active charity and civic leader. City Schools Get Good Use

Torrance school facilities were used more than 1100 times by various non-school groups during the last three months of 1960, according to a recent report to the Board of Education. This is an average of about 13 times per day for the period. Leading user of school facilities was the Torrance Recreation Department, which had 366 permits. Other leading users include Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, and Brownies, 321 permits; Boy Scouts and

Cub Scouts, 114; YMCA, 90; PTA, 43; Little League, 46; university extension courses, 40. Other miscellaneous users were by youth groups, barber-shop quartets, the Red Cross, homeowners' groups, Community Chest, postal workers, March of Dimes, and various other civic groups. The Civic Center Act provides that schools may be used by various civic organizations outside of the times when they are needed for actual instruc-
