Garden Checklist

1. Many vegetable plants are available in flats, including tomatoes, lettuce, chard and celery. They are easily transplanted.
2. Set out spring-blooming annuals. A flat full of pansies or calendula will bring spring to your garden in a hurry.
3. Prune roses if you haven't already. Prune fuchsias, also, and don't be afraid to cut them back.
4. New camellia varieties are showing bloom each week in nurseries. There's no better time to buy them than when you can see the blooms.
5. Bare-root shade trees, fruit trees and shrubs can be planted through February. The earlier the better.

Prominent Educators See More Federal Aid for Local Schools

Both state and federal aid to education will increase in the future, but only the state is likely to extend its control over local school operations and administration.

That is the outlook expressed in "School Administration," a new book authored by Prof. Emery Stoops of the University of Southern California, and M. L. Rafferty Jr., USC graduate who is now superintendent of schools at Needles, Calif. Dr. Stoops is a professor of educational administration and supervision at USC.

INDICATING their strong belief that there is a trend toward increased federal aid for schools, Professor Stoops and Superintendent Rafferty wrote:

"Everything points to an eventual adoption of the principle that a decent education is the birthright of every American.

"Indications are that a vast majority of our people already have adopted this as part of the American ideal—and that Congress, as usual, may be the last to recognize it.

"In the century and a half since the first steps were taken to put the federal govern-

ment into the education business, the trend has been clear. Federal aid and financial contributions have intensified and multiplied in areas undreamed of by the founders of our form of government."

THE AUTHORS of "School Administration" believe, however, that increased federal aid to education will not mean increased federal efforts to control:

"In our democracy it is extremely difficult, if not impossible, to put something into effect which most people dislike and mistrust. That is why a way will be found to pour the nation's wealth into local schools without the necessity for sacrificing the sturdy independence of individual districts and their governing boards."

Concerning increased state aid, Professor Stoops and Superintendent Rafferty see the trend in most states as being toward shifting financial support of the public schools from the local taxpayer to the state treasury.

"The real property tax," says Stoops and Rafferty, "no longer represents an adequate foundation for educational revenue."
