Hollywood Park Again Offering 'Richest' Purse

Hollywood Park's 1961 thoroughbred race meeting, May 10 to July 24, appears certain to continue to be the world leader in purses paid to the horsemen for stakes and "overnight" races.

The California Horse Racing Board has approved a schedule of 33 stakes for a total value of approximately \$1,000,000 added for the 55-day season, according to James D. Stewart, vice-president and general manager.

He estimated that approximately twice that amount would be paid the horsemen in prize money for the 407 "overnights" making a total purse distribution of approximately \$3,600,000. The total net distribution to the horsemen last year was \$3,531,500.

Air Force Plans New University Training Corps

A new jet-age college education for Air Force cadets, including a \$1000 per year grant for each student selected, is part of the streamlined overhaul proposed for the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps, according to word received from Washington, D.C., by Lt. Colonel John A. Newbauer, director of the University of Southern California AFROTC program and professor of Air Science.

This major proposal, just off the Pentagon drawing boards, was outlined by the Air Force Advisory Panel recently and is now awaiting the final approval of the Department of Defense.

The new program built around merit scholarship is the first major change in the Air Force ROTC program since its inception in 1916, Colonel Newbauer said.

"THE AIR FORCE 'new look' will be smaller and more selective to meet the specialized needs of the jet age. A cut from the present set-up of 107,000 basic and advanced cadets to 5000 high-caliber students per year will mark a more realistic approach to the USAF yearly requirement of only 3500 personnel.

This new frontier for space training aimed for 1962 will drop its old tag — Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps — and will be christened the "Air Force Officer Education Program," emphasizing education of career officers.

ANY STUDENT wishing to enter the forthcoming two-year program can apply for the nation-wide competitive tests after completing the freshman and sophomore years of college. All cadets will be chosen on a selective basis ending compulsory recruiting.

The Air Force "new look" will also save the taxpayers some \$2 to \$4 million dollars per year, it has been estimated. The present plan costs \$26 million dollars a year, explained the USC director.

The new changes were proposed as an answer to the new air technology problems. Today, the USAF is not dependent upon large reserve forces but upon high-quality technical professional career officers, regulars and reserves who will remain in the active capacity for many years after their training and initial active service, said Col. Newbauer.

Veteran Pair Into Dodger Player Fold

Johnny Podres and Charlie Neal inked their Dodger contracts yesterday, leaving only 18 of the 38 players on the roster, unsigned.

Podres, the dean of the Dodgers' pitching staff, has seven National League campaigns behind him and more big league victories than any member of the current Dodger staff (82).

Last season was his best on several counts. He started more games than he had ever started (33), pitched more innings (228), and had more strikeouts (159), and his victory total of 14 tied his 1959 output.

Neal, hitting .256 last season, fell far below his excellent performance when he was one of the Dodgers' most consistent offensive threats in their championship campaign of 1959. For one month, however, he was hot, batting .373 from June 20 through July 20. Last year he led the Dodgers in sacrifice bunts (14), was second in doubles (23) and also in sacrifice flies (7).

Lakers Face Pistons in Detroit Tilt

The Los Angeles Lakers tackle the Detroit Pistons in another key game for the Lakers tonight in Detroit.

With the Lakers scrambling for a playoff berth, every game becomes an important one now and doubly important are the ones against the other playoff aspirants — Detroit and Cincinnati.
