Sepulveda Work On Schedule, **Chace Reports**

Supervisor Burton W. Chace reported yesterday that con-struction work on Sepulveda Blvd., from Figueroa St. to Main St., in the Carson area, is progressing on sckedule. Chace said the north barrel of the proposed four lang birth

of the proposed four-lane high-way has been paved and the west-bound approach aprons completed. . . .

TRAFFIC will soon be di-verted onto this completed leg while the south half of the roadway is being constructed, he added.

The improvement, approxi-mately one-half mile in length, consists of reconstruction to alleviate critical structural de-ficiencies, and widening the street to four lanes. Chace added that completion of this project will provide im-

Chace added that completion of this project will provide im-proved access to the proposed Harbor Freeway and also be an important step in the ulti-mate development of this major east-west highway.


